Peter Krsko was drilling holes in the trees on his property in Wisconsin for the liquid that would ultimately become maple syrup (枫树糖浆). While he was labouring, Krsko began to think about how trees fight gravity and move liquid from their roots deep in the ground up to the leaves. That got him thinking about cells, the basic passages for those liquids, and how

they pack together to build the tissues and organs found in living things.

“I wanted to share with you what I was thinking about while I was drilling holes,” the artist, scientist and educator later explained to his class at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

That class, called Zoethica: Bioinspired Art and Science, is part of Krsko’s semester-long course. Krsko chose the name Zoethica, a combination of the Greek word for life (zoe) and the word ethical, because his goal is “to explore bioinspired art and technology, not only from the aesthetic (美学的) and scientific point of view, but also to explore the ethical implications”.

“I like to trick my students into thinking about things that are all around us but are invisible. There is so much talent hidden in places that have never had the chance to shine,” he said. “I want them to think outside the box. I hope they learn and grow from the experience.”

That means challenging students to consider aspects of the world they may never have considered. It’s part of his pursuit to find ways to make science accessible to all and to inspire natural curiosity about the world.

Because Zoethica is an experience in inspiration, students are tasked with reviewing literature from multiple disciplines to arrive at answers to questions posed by Krsko, or those they come up with organically as they progress through the class.

For example, one student wondered out loud why there are no wheels to be found in nature. Krsko challenged him to solve the puzzle.

“He had to figure that out, looking at the literature in biophysics, evolution, biology, to arrive at an answer to why it is not possible for animals to have wheels,” Krsko said.

“We still have a lot to learn from nature,” he said.

Despite decades of medical advances, detecting health-related molecules (分子) still relies on bodily liquids like blood, requiring blood draws from most patients, especially people with diabetes who need frequent finger blood tests. However, researchers from the University of Chicago have developed a **lightweight** device named ABLE, which collects and detects molecules in the air. This 4×8-inch device is a potential **game changer** for medicine and public health.

Detecting molecules in the air has long fallen behind liquid **detection**, mainly because target particles (微粒) are extremely rare—

there may be only one in a trillion. To solve this problem, the team turned air into liquid. The device draws in air, adds water vapor with a humidifier, and cools it to turn air into small drops. These drops trap particles and slide into a small container, making detection easy with common tools used for liquid analysis.

Early tests proved its **effectiveness**. It caught easily evaporated (挥发的) coffee vapor, detected glucose in breath, identified E.coli in the air, and found signs of inflammation (炎症) in mice with unhealthy gut bacteria. Obviously, it solved the problem of collecting molecules that evaporate easily—a major worry during the device’s development.

The device was first inspired by the need for **painless** tests for early-born babies in ICUs. These fragile babies are likely to have health problems, and repeated blood tests may put them in danger. Doctors hope the device can track health signs without taking blood, protecting these high-risk patients. It also shows promise for diagnosing inflammatory bowel disease, though the related breath signs first need to be recorded. The team plans to improve and make it smaller to create a **wearable** device for daily use.

Besides medical uses, this achievement may open the door to new physics research on air **impurities** and state changes of matter. As a new tool for detecting air chemistry, ABLE fills the space between air and liquid molecule analysis, creating **possibilities** for various new developments in healthcare and science.

Wetlands are widely valued as natural pollution cleaners and habitats for endangered species. Holding carbon dioxide-processing microbes (微生物) that play a key role in climate change dynamics, they’re also a key part of the carbon cycle: although wetlands cover only about 3% of Earth’s surface, they account for as much as 30% of soil carbon **storage**. Yet some wetland microbes secrete another powerful greenhouse gas—methane, which may cancel out some of the benefits of pulling carbon dioxide from the atmosphere.

Tringe, an **environmental microbiologist** in the US, is trying to determine just how much wetlands actually help counteract climate change, by turning to a novel discipline called metagenomics, which involves sequencing (测序) the **collective** genetic materials of all the microbes in a given location.

Scientists use chemicals to take out the genetic material from an environmental sample—say, a cup of dirty water. They run cloned snippets (克隆片段) of the material through a sequencing machine, which reads out what makes up each snippet. After all the data are pieced back together, they reveal the distinct gene sequences of the millions of microbes in the sample. The result: a broad overview of the microbial community and the

functions each microbe performs within the ecosystem.

Tringe's sampling has brought some evidence that certain landscape characteristics influence microbial populations in ways that affect greenhouse gas releases and carbon storage. Saltier wetland areas, for example, tend to attract microbial communities that produce less methane, as do areas with more active water flows. "We're able to predict which sites might produce more or less methane," Tringe says. Data, however, are still limited, so Tringe cannot definitively say how wetland **restoration** planners can best limit these releases while keeping carbon storage processes undamaged.

Ultimately, Tringe wants to create computer models allowing experts to analyse the potential greenhouse gas effects of various restoration strategies. But what fires Tringe's imagination even more than shaping wetlands' environmental legacy is mapping a microbial universe that has long been hidden.

A few years ago, teenager Mia Heller came across an article in her local newspaper about ongoing water quality issues in her neighbourhood in Warrenton, Virginia. Tests had revealed that the water available for daily consumption was highly polluted by microplastics. Not long after that, Heller's parents invested in a water filtration system at her home. The system, however, comes with high price tags and constant upkeep. Seeing her mother replace the water filter membranes (膜) time and again, Heller set out to find a better solution.

By early January of 2025, after testing in her garage and kitchen and overcoming obstacles, she had a working prototype (原型). "It was essentially just a container," she says. Within the container was her filtration system. Heller chose a reusable magnetic (磁性的) oil called ferrofluid to selectively bind to microplastics as water flows through her filtration system. While her model successfully filtered out the microplastics from the water in two simple steps, the system still required constant maintenance, as it did not self-recycle the ferrofluid.

Determined to find an answer, Heller continued experimenting. About five trials later, she found the perfect solution. Her current prototype, which is about the size of a standard bag of flour, consists of three modules. The first unit, about a litre in volume, holds the polluted water inside it, while the second stores the magnetic oil-based ferrofluid. The core process takes place in the

third module, which is much smaller. "A magnetic field pulls the microplastics out of the water, and the ferrofluid is recovered and reused in a closed circle," explains Heller.

According to her tests, her prototype successfully removed 95.52 percent of microplastics from the water and recycled 87.15 percent of the ferrofluid. Traditional drinking-water treatment plants remove about 70 to more than 90 percent of microplastic components. "The result is an affordable, low-waste filtration system without the use of a solid membrane," says Heller.

For her innovation, Heller was a finalist in the 2025 Regeneron International Science and Engineering Fair, the world's largest global science competition for high school students.

Early in life, we absorb our native language. We give people and things names. That is Mummy. Those are trees. We slice and sort the world with grammar. A tree's roots are home to millions of microorganisms and hundreds of macro ones. Blossom falls, water evaporates, and vast networks of fungi (真菌) pass messages between arboreal (树栖的) friends. Words, though, will abstract the tree. They'll cut away the roots, ignore the organisms, and isolate their functions. We are taught to see only the tree.

The award-winning, best-selling nature writer Robert Macfarlane explored in his new book, *Is A River Alive?*, how far our words and understanding cut up and abstract the rivers in our lives. He recognizes that nature can be a resource that advances human development, but he believes we have gone too far in this direction. Our language shows the way we think, and we increasingly treat nature as something without life—cold, unfeeling, just being there for us to exploit (开采).

In *The Question Concerning Technology*, Martin Heidegger argued that so much of the modern mindset sees nature as a standing reserve. We pour waste water into rivers and burn ancient woodlands because we see them as resources. We see the instrumental value of nature rather than recognize it as a thing with its own value. Germany's Rhine, for example, has been the source of inspiration for thousands of poets, writers, and walkers. It's existed as something with its own kind of life force and personality. Yet, once a hydroelectric dam is built into the river, it appears as something at our command, losing its autonomous liveliness.

As Alan Watts put it, "The game of Western philosophy and science is to trap the universe in a network of words and numbers, so there is always the temptation (诱惑) to confuse grammar with the actual operations of

nature. Air and water cannot be cut or held, and their flow stops when they are enclosed. There is no way of putting a stream in a bucket or the wind in a bag."

If you're looking for someone to debate the new *Wuthering Heights* movie with, you might want to start with Lucasta Miller. She's a British author, editor and critic who has published a well-known study of Emily Brontë and wrote an **introduction** for the Penguin Classics edition of *Wuthering Heights*.

When she had the chance to see Emerald Fennell's **adaptation** of the Emily Brontë's

novel last week, she was well aware of the liberties taken by the director, but was unbothered.

“It would be meaningless to criticize it for that, just as it would be **unreasonable** to criticize an opera that changed the original plot,” Miller said. “I do not ask for a faithful adaptation of *Wuthering Heights*, but I value whether it works on its own terms. And my sense is that it does.”

Fennell’s *Wuthering Heights* was the box office leader last weekend, bringing in more than \$34 million in North America alone, despite mostly negative reviews that found the movie both **overdone** and unsatisfying. Even before its release, Brontë’s fans questioned some of Fennell’s choices: having the famously dark-haired Cathy played by the blond Margot Robbie; casting Jacob Elordi as Heathcliff instead of a dark-skinned actor closer to how Brontë described the character.

Authors have long been unsatisfied with adaptations. But countless adaptations have served as showcases for innovative licence. Billy Wilder’s film version of James Cain’s *Double Indemnity* had the main character tell his story through a dictation machine, an innovation that Cain himself thought so smart that he wished he had used it in the book.

“You know, the book is mine and it’s my baby. But the film is Billy’s adaptation,” Cain told The Associated Press in December. “And the film feels not like my child, more like a kind of niece or nephew. And that’s exactly as it should be.”

Fennell recalled during a recent interview that she was inspired by her early memories of the novel. “There are things I added for my own needs, because I loved the book very much when I was still a teenager, and I always desperately needed some kind of sense for it to go a little further,” she admitted.

In the age of large language models (LLMs) and **generative** AI, we are witnessing an unprecedented **transformation** in how knowledge is produced, spread and consumed.

LLMs, we are told, make us more efficient, **simplify** complex work, automate boring tasks and allow us to focus on what matters. But as we feel surprised at their capabilities, a pressing concern emerges: Are these models genuinely boosting efficiency, or are they eroding our capacity for independent thought, judgement and critical reflection?

Efficiency is not a neutral term. The current narrative around generative AI treats efficiency as progress. It suggests that the faster something is done, the better. But faster is not always better. And not everything that can be automated should be.

The popular belief is that LLMs allow humans to assign repetitive work to machines and reserve their energy for more reflective tasks, but the opposite is often true. As the more intellectual labour—writing, summarizing and decision-making, for example—is handed over to AI, the less we will engage with it ourselves. Instead of reserving our **thoughtfulness** for higher tasks, we will increasingly lose the opportunities, and perhaps even the ability, to think critically.

So what do we really mean by “efficiency”? If it means shortening the time it takes to write a report, perhaps we have succeeded. But if it means replacing the intellectual effort that creates depth, coherence and reflection, then it’s not a gain; it’s a loss. The moment we accept LLMs as thought substitutes, rather than thought aids, we begin to worsen the very conditions under which human reasoning thrives: questioning, dialogue, uncertainty and contradiction.

There is no turning back the **presence** of LLMs in our lives. But we can choose how to live with them. The question is not whether they will think for us, but whether we will let them define what it means to think at all. Efficiency, in the true sense, should not be about doing more with less thought. It should

be about doing better, with deeper attention, stronger ethics and sustained human insight.

Though seemingly ordinary, bus stops are an essential part of any urban ecosystem. On the surface, they simply provide shelter for people waiting for the bus, but they can also be places for people to find information, socialize, and sometimes, even to experience art. Now, however, cities around the world are discovering another use for bus stops. According to *The Washington Post*, they are taking these structures that are essentially nothing more than three walls and a roof and turning them into homes for wildlife.

Adding green roofs to bus stops was once simply a small initiative in the Netherlands. Now, however, the environmentally friendly innovation is spreading throughout Europe, North America, and Asia.

So, why are so many cities building green bus stops? For one, they keep things cool, and this is not only because they provide commuters (通勤者) with shelter from the sun. Green roofs in general have been shown to reduce the urban heat island effect, and can lower the surrounding air temperature by 20 degrees Fahrenheit.

Likewise, green bus stops, especially those planted with biodiverse, native plants, are a boon to local wildlife. For instance, in Utrecht, the green bus stops have been designed to create a belt of bee lines that provide the insects with consistent food. And in fact, the national bee census has been showing signs that the bee population in the city is growing.

Researchers from the Society for the Protection of Underground Networks (SPUN), an organization devoted to the study and protection of the world's mycorrhizae, a type of fungus (真菌), discovered that Utrecht's network of green bus stop roofs was bursting with fungal biodiversity.

"There's something just so special about sitting underneath a biodiversity hotspot while waiting to go to work," Justin Steward, a data scientist at SPUN, said of Utrecht's fungi-rich bus stop gardens. Across the Atlantic, in

Boston, green bus stops have been visited by more than just bees. "We've seen butterflies, bees, birds, even squirrels," Zoe Davis, the city's senior climate resilience project manager, told *The Washington Post*.
